There are light carvings of other smaller animal and human figures around these two central figures. This rock art is believed to be 6000-8000 years old. This rock art is believed to be world's largest petroglyph.

**Rock Art of Alta, Norway**: Another UNESCO World Heritage site, Alta features rock carvings created by the indigenous Sami people, offering a unique perspective on their culture and history.

Kakadu National Park, Australia: Covering almost 20,000 sq.km., this largest national park of Australia is home to ancient rock art. Kakadu is known for its Aboriginal petroglyphs that depict indigenous stories, ceremonies, and dreamtime mythology.


